this study was conducted with South African women, the researchers believe that the results are generalizable to women across the world, as intimate partner violence and factors that make HIV-positive women more vulnerable are not unique to South Africa. The researchers have suggested that a diagnosis of HIV may bring stress into a relationship that is not already impacted by intimate partner violence, and that early intervention is important. Women's Advocates seeks to provide information on the health impacts of domestic violence to every community organization where we provide trainings. # Connections between animal cruelty and domestic violence:

Pets may be an important factor for individuals who are attempting to leave an abusive relationship, as 71% of abusers have threatened to hurt a family pet, or have harmed that pet, as a means of maintaining power and control. This can be a motivating factor for some victims to leave, or, if the abuser owns the pet, some victims may remain in the relationship in order to protect the pet. However, there are resources for victims who feel stuck between a rock and a hard place when it comes to pets. The Domestic Violence Initiative, a service from Minneapolis Animal Care and Control, has provided free boarding and veterinary care for the last eight years to animals owned by individuals experiencing domestic violence or homelessness. #### Violence in the literary community:

This year's Nobel Prize in Literature award and ceremony was cancelled by the Swedish Academy after a popular French photographer linked to the Academy was accused of sexual harassment and assault against 18 women. After the accusations became public, eight members of the Academy walked out, several of them women who were protesting his conduct. The literary community has faced a #MeToo reckoning of its own this year, with
